NYWBA Events Committee is "Dressed to Kill" Touring the Met By Elizabeth Larrauri Chamulak

The morning of Saturday, November 16, 2019, was the start of a chilly day. However, the chill did not keep the *NYWBA Events Committee* and friends from meeting at the Metropolitan Museum of Art for the "Dressed to Kill" Tour to celebrate the love of history and fashion. The tour, designed and personally guided by *Professor Andrew Lear*, the founder of Shady Ladies Tours, was a colorful and informative two-hour trek through the museum's various rooms covering a wide array of empires, cultures, traditions and standards of beauty throughout the centuries.

Professor Lear commenced the tour in the Ancient Greek galleries with an examination of the glass jars, jewelry, decorative boxes, jugs and compact mirror holders. I will admit to never giving much thought to the actual decorative designs on these exhibit pieces; however, many of the items depicted scenes of women beautifying themselves (with the assistance of servants/slaves, which seemed to be a common theme). Homemade ointments, perfumes, and make-up (which were in many cases likely lethal) were the main objects ancient Greek women and men used to live up to their time period's standard of beauty.

The Imperial Roman busts in the Egyptian galleries, brass heads in the Nigerian galleries, jewelry in the Ancient Americas, Africa and Antarctica wing and paintings in the 16th/17th Century all evidenced the various standards of beauty in regards to hair (length, amount, facial), clothing (color, fabric, style) and body distortions (colorings, distended ear lobes, neck rings and flat heads). Even in ancient times, keeping up with society's view of beauty could be harmful and deadly.

Professor Lear continued onto the European collections of the 16th, 17th and 18th centuries. Powdered wigs, white cotton t-shirts, spritz baths, cod pieces, corsets, hoop skirts, puffy sleeves, henna, and men's tights were all seen as fashionable displays of wealth. The Renaissance era celebrated women's plump bodies as beautiful. A view of Marie Antoinette's court found courtesans and royalty dressed alike in gold clothes, high powdered wigs and bear grease makeup. The tour concluded in the 18th and 19th century wing, displaying Empress Josephine's influence on women's fashion with empire waists, plain cloth and tights.

"Dressed to Kill" displayed that throughout the ages, what is considered beautiful and fashionable is not only defined by sexiness or physical attractiveness. As the old saying goes, "beauty is in the eye of the beholder," which was clearly evidenced during the tour.

Broadway Night Featuring an Evening at "Come From Away" By Elizabeth Larrauri Chamulak

The **NYWBA Events Committee** sponsored one of its periodic Broadway Night evenings on November 21, 2019. Our group went to see the musical, *Come From Away*, at the Gerald Schoenfeld Theatre. The musical is a Canadian production created in 2012. It opened on Broadway on March 12, 2017. In October 2018 it became the longest running Canadian show on Broadway. *Come From Away* was nominated at the 71st Tony Awards for seven awards, including Best Musical, Best Original Score, Best Book of a Musical, and won for Best Direction of a Musical (Christopher Ashley).

If you do not know what the musical is about going in, once it is revealed, it is a gut punch of emotions. *Come From Away* is the remarkable true story of the people of Gander, a small town in Newfoundland, and the Canadian Operation Yellow Ribbon. The events of *Come From Away* begin on September 11, 2001 and continue for the week following the attacks. Immediately following the attacks on September 11th, air traffic to the United States was diverted and U.S. air space was closed to commercial planes. Canada assisted in the redirection of the U.S. air traffic by opening its airports to those planes. Thirty-eight planes carrying nearly seven thousand passengers were directed to Gander. The story continues with the people of Gander opening their collective arms to welcome, house and feed the stranded visitors.

Focus was given to real life individuals such as Beverley Bass, a pilot for American Airlines who was the first female captain at the airline. The musical number, "Me and the Sky" was based on her life story. Hannah, a mother who could not contact her son, a fireman with FDNY, was left fearing the worst in "I Am Here". Romance blossomed for one pair of passengers who met under the difficult circumstances (update: that pair, Nick and Diane Marson, are married and still visit Gander), while another couple's relationship imploded under the strain. Throughout that week, the charming folks of Gander shared their homes and hearts with the airplane passengers and crews who were made honorary Newfoundlanders at a local bar. The show ends with a ten-year reunion of the passengers who return to Gander to celebrate the friendships they made under the saddest and darkest of circumstances.

The sets were simple and the costumes were not elaborate. The cast was small and the actors did double and triple duty throughout the show. The performance ran for over an hour and a half with no intermission (an intermission would have interrupted the emotional journey). The musical numbers were moving and heartfelt. The loud and clear message of hope and kindness was powerful, made all the more poignant because it was a true story.

New York Women's Bar Association Foundation Conversation with Carrie Goldberg, Author, Online Privacy Expert and Victims' Rights Lawyer By Annie M. Ugurlayan

On November 6, 2019, the **New York Women's Bar Association Foundation (NYWBAF)** held a conversation and book signing with **Carrie Goldberg**, victims' rights lawyer in Brooklyn who litigates nationally on behalf of targets of online harassment, stalking, and sexual assault. A trailblazer in online privacy, she has been profiled in *The New Yorker*, *The Times (London)*, *Glamour*, *Jezebel*, and *The New York Post*. Ms. Goldberg's new and highly acclaimed book, *Nobody's Victim: Fighting Stalkers*, *Psychos*, *Pervs and Trolls*, was published by Penguin in August 2019.

The event was held in the stunning art gallery of the law firm Lee Anav Chung White Kim Ruger & Richter LLP. After a short reception, NYW-BAF President *Gretchen Beall Schumann* welcomed the guests and introduced Carrie Goldberg and *Megan Goddard*, an employment law attorney, who led the discussion.

Ms. Goldberg explained that she was inspired to write her book not only financially (to make payroll) but also to tell the story of her unique firm, explain the pervasiveness of online sexual harassment and violence, and teach people about how to get justice if they are victims of online sexual stalking. Ms. Goldberg herself was a victim of sexual stalking and had a hard time learning how to fight back. In 2014, she decided to open her firm to help victims of online sexual harassment who felt they did not have any recourse, legal or otherwise.

Ms. Goldberg explained that online sexual harassment can start at a young age which can further complicate things. According to Ms. Goldberg, schools have a pattern of blaming children who are victims of online sexual harassment and NYC public schools have very few resources to deal with this issue -- there is only one Title IX coordinator for 1 million NYC students.

Ms. Goddard asked Ms. Goldberg about her thoughts on the #MeToo movement. Ms. Goldberg said she was wary of having clients become spokespersons for the movement or to begin litigation right away, as it can be a difficult experience. She explained that negotiation can be effective.

Ms. Goldberg also highlighted key advocacy victories to protect victims. She has worked closely with Google to ban non-consensual porn. As for her legislative work, she noted that 46 states (including NY) have laws banning non-consensual porn. Ms. Goldberg has worked to expand the statute of limitations for sexual assault in the 2nd and 3rd degrees. In addition, NY has now changed its law to make clear that in sexual assault cases, consent is not a defense if the victim is in custody.

On a personal note, Ms. Goldberg shared that prior to going to law school she worked at self-help community service agency where she helped Holocaust survivors. She said it was one of the hardest jobs, and that her reparations work inspired her to go to law school. She also noted that she admires Ronan Farrow for his work in exposing Harvey Weinstein and other high-profile perpetrators.

In closing, Ms. Goldberg stressed the importance of having compassion for victims. In an era of electronic communications, it is important to understand that people of all ages commonly send private personal pictures, never expecting them to become public. But once they are public, it is almost impossible to remove them, victimizing the person in perpetuity. Tech companies have the ability to develop tools to take down such photos. She argued that pressure on tech companies to protect victims is the only way to effectuate change.

Ms. Goldberg signed copies of her book after her talk. All in attendance were shocked by how little they knew about the pervasiveness of revenge porn and greatly appreciated learning about Ms. Goldberg's efforts to combat it. Many thanks to Judy White and Lee Anav Chung White Kim Ruger & Richter LLP for hosting the event, to NYWBAF Gretchen Schumann for donating the wine for the event, and to NYWBA member Megan Goddard for moderating.
